Jottings from Jake & Jill

As you noticed in the last issue of the OES News, subscriptions to the Eastern Star Journal (ESJ) are increasing in Nebraska. We're *pleased* that our membership has made an active effort to subscribe. In the last issue there was a survey from the General Grand Chapter Ritual Committee (on behalf of our Most Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron) requesting that members give their input. The question regards shortening initiation by removing repetition in the ceremony and changing the language in our initiatory lectures to reflect everyday, conversational language rather than retaining the current language.

A number of people have asked me about the survey and have expressed *very differing opinions* about this issue. People who feel that the ritual should remain the same say that everyday language would

take away the poetic beauty of the ritual citing The Lord's Prayer which does not use everyday language. Regarding the length of the initiatory ceremony, those in favor of retaining it as is, say that other parts of our meetings could take less time so that we could enjoy the initiations more. Others have pointed out that repetition is a key tenet of teaching that an idea is presented, then repeated in different ways to enhance and clarify the ideas being "taught". It has also been mentioned that young people study Shakespeare and other literary authors (whose language is hardly that of this day and age) in high school. There are those members on the other side of the issue who say the lectures are hard to learn (confusing) and would be easier to understand in everyday language.

Here's a thought expressed by a minister from the pulpit recently. "Cursive writing and

love" are much the same. Both have many facets. Each is a process that you understand and appreciate with time. Eastern Star could take the place of the word "love" when compared to cursive writing as well. As new members we hear the words; the more we study our Star Point lectures and hear our initiatory work, the more we appreciate and understand it.

We hope that Nebraska members will *respond to the survey* and let *your opinion be known*. Our Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron are making an effort to be in touch with the membership. EXPRESS YOUR OPINION. They will appreciate it very much.
